

How to Start a Business in Iowa

Checklist

1.

Form your business. □	
1.1. Review formation options in Iowa. \square	
Review the different formation options offered in lowa and pick the one that	
best suits your business.	
1.2. Name your business. □	
Research your business name and check with the Iowa Secretary of State if it	
is available for you to use. Then, apply to reserve the name.	
1.3. Get an Employer Identification Number. \square	
Apply for an EIN with the IRS.	
1.4. Register your business in Iowa. □	
Sole proprietorships and general partnerships must contact their local county	
recorder to find out about registering their business. Limited partnerships,	
limited liability partnerships, limited liability companies, and corporations must	
register with the Iowa Secretary of State.	
1.5. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square	
The state of lowa does not require businesses to have a statewide business	
license. You may, however, need specific business licenses and permits	
depending on the type of business you start in lowa.	
1.6. Register a fictitious business name. \square	
Sole proprietorships and general partnerships must register a trade name with	
their local county recorder while all other business structures must file a	
resolution to adopt a fictitious name with the state. This can only be done if	
your business is already registered.	

2.	Register your business for taxes. □
	2.1. Register for Iowa sales tax. □
	If your business sells tangible personal property and other taxable products
	and services, you require a sales tax permit. You can register for sales tax with
	the Iowa Department of Revenue by mail, fax, or online.
	2.2. Register for consumer's use tax. \square
	lowa businesses that purchase taxable goods or services that are consumed in
	lowa but do not pay sales tax when they are making the purchase must
	register for consumer's use tax. This can be done by mail, fax, or online.
	2.3. Register for withholding tax. \square
	Businesses in Iowa that have employees must register for withholding tax as
	they are required to withhold federal income tax on the compensation they
	pay their employees. This can be done by mail, fax, or online.
3.	Report new hires and get insurance. \square
	3.1. Report employees to the state. \square
	Employers in Iowa are required to report new hires and re-hired employees to
	the state within 15 days of employment.
	3.2. Obtain mandatory insurance. □
	lowa's law requires all employers to provide workers' compensation coverage
	to their employees.
	3.3. Display required posters. □
	Employers are required to display certain mandatory posters in the workplace.
