

How to Start a Business in Kansas

Checklist

1.	Form your business. □
	1.1. Review Kansas formation options. \square
	There are six ways of forming your business in Kansas. Choose the one that
	suits your business best.
	1.2. Name your business. □
	Verify that your desired name does not already exist by running a name
	search. Only reserve the business name if you require extra time to file
	formation documents.
	1.3. Get an Employer Identification Number. \square
	Apply for an Employer Identification Number (EIN) or a Kansas Tax ID number
	with the IRS.
	1.4. Get an Employer Identification Number. \square
	Sole proprietorships and general partners do not need to file with the state.
	LLCs and corporations must file certificates of formation online. Create an
	account with the Kansas Department of Revenue to register.
	1.5. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square
	Visit Kansas Business One Stop to find out which licenses and permits you
	require.
	1.6. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square
	Contact your local municipality to find out more about their regulations and
	the permits you will need.

2.	Register your business for taxes. □
	2.1. Register for tax. □
	When you register your business with the Kansas Department of Revenue,
	you automatically complete your tax application.
	2.2. Determine the type of tax you need to pay. \Box
	Do the survey on the Kansas Department of Revenue's website to double-
	check that you have registered for the correct taxes.
3.	Hire employees and report them to the state. \Box
	3.1. Visit the Kansas Department of Labor's website. \Box
	Use electronic reporting to report new hires. Alternatively, fax or send a
	printed list of the required information.
	3.2. Obtain Workers' Compensation Insurance. \Box
	Obtain workers' compensation insurance from an insurance company or
	through your broker from the Kansas Insurance Department.
	3.3. Display mandatory posters in your workplace. \square
	Ensure that all mandatory posters are displayed at all your worksites. Visit the
	Kansas Department of Labor website to download state posters and the U.S.
	Department of Labor website to download federal posters.
