

How to Start a Business in Maine

Checklist

1.	Form your business. □
	1.1. Review Maine formation options. \square
	There are four primary ways of forming a business in Maine. Review each
	option and select the one that best suits your business.
	1.2. Name your business. \square
	Perform a corporate entity name search to check that your chosen name is
	available for you to use and file a name reservation.
	1.3. Get an Employer Identification Number. \square
	Register Apply for an Employer Identification Number with the IRS.
	1.4. Register your business in Maine. □
	Sole proprietorships and partnership are not required to register with the
	state. If you are forming a legal business entity, such as a corporation or an
	LLC, you must register with the Bureau of Corporations at the office of the
	Maine SOS.
	1.5. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square
	Sole proprietorships and partnership are not required to register with the

2.	Register your business for taxes. \square
	2.1. Register for tax with Maine Revenue Services. \square
	Investigate which type of tax accounts your business needs and register with
	Maine Revenue Services to set up your tax accounts.

2.2. Register for sales and use tax. □	
If your business sells tangible personal property in Maine, you must register	
for sales and use tax with Maine Revenue Services.	
2.3. Register for income tax withholding. \square	
Businesses in Maine that employ one or more individuals and pay salaries,	
wages, or compensation must register for income tax withholding.	
2.4. Register for service provider tax. □	
If you provide a service, you may have to register for service provider tax.	
Contact Maine Revenue Services or visit their website to find out if your	
service is subject to service provider tax and, if so, register a service provider	
tax account.	
2.5. Register for unemployment insurance tax. \square	
If your business in Maine has employees, you will need to register for	
unemployment insurance tax with the Maine Department of Labor.	
Report employees to the state and get insurance. \Box	
3.1. Report employees to the state. \square	
Report each of your newly hired and re-hired employees to the Maine	
Division of Support Enforcement & Recovery within 20 days of employment.	
This can be done online, by mail, or by fax.	
3.2. Obtain mandatory insurance. □	
Almost all employers are required to carry workers' compensation insurance.	
Domestic workers are exempt. Minimum automobile insurance for business	
drivers is also mandatory in Maine.	
3.3. Display mandatory posters in your place of business. \square	
Employers in Maine are required to display certain labor posters in the	
workplace. These are available from the Maine Department of Labor.	

3.
